Incorporating management approaches on-farm that benefit soil health can be tricky – it requires practical and science-based information to make it a long-term success. In general, farmers get information from separate sources. They may hear how cover crops worked for a farmer highlighted in a magazine, or get a recommendation on fertilizer applications from their agronomist or sit through a scientific presentation on conservation tillage from a scientist or extension specialist. Rarely do they have the opportunity to hear all three perspectives on a single topic in one session. In this session, we will incorporate the different perspectives of farmers, agronomists and scientists/specialists in a panel discussion covering how to manage your soils using cover crops, conservation tillage and precision fertility.

Our version of speed-dating






